Mayor's Message

We said goodbye to 2022 and welcomed in 2023 and what I am most amazed at is how incredibly long it now takes me to scroll back to my "year of birth" when entering information on computer forms. Its as if my computer is mocking me. This backwards scroll also serves to remind me how, at once, things change while they stay the same. The Borough of Oceanport is actually a great example of that. The Oceanport Historical Committee recently published its long-awaited celebration of Oceanport's first 100 years – aptly titled "Oceanport A Great Place To Live" -- and this meticulously researched, beautifully written and visually arresting retrospective of all things Oceanport documents how dramatically Oceanport's infrastructure has changed while, at the same time, its small town sense of community and commitment to volunteerism have remained the same.

Within the book's 336 pages, the Oceanport Historical Committee – specifically, Frank Baricelli, John Bonforte, Tom Cavanaugh, Robin Kelly, Rosanne Letson, Paula Lombardo, Mike MacStudy, Barbara Sheppard, Ric Siciliano, and Toni Sverapa – has memorialized the amazing metamorphosis Oceanport has undergone over the past century and, given the continuing redevelopment of Fort Monmouth, will continue to experience in its second century. "Oceanport, A Great Place To Live" is a labor of love towards which each Historical Committee member volunteered hours upon hours of their free time.

No member, however, dedicated more time, effort and love towards its publication than Oceanport's Historian, Frank Baricelli. Quite simply, without Frank Baricelli's single-minded devotion to this project and his encyclopedic knowledge of Oceanport's history, this project would not have been as successful. Anybody who has come into contact with Frank, knows that he served as Oceanport's historian long, long before he was appointed as our official Historian in 2018. Frank passed away on November 27, 2022 shortly after "Oceanport A Great Place To Live" was completed and sent to the printer. Sadly, he did not get to see the finished product and the people of Oceanport have been forever deprived of the opportunity to speak with Frank about the borough's history. Frank was a walking, talking irreplaceable font of information about Oceanport whose comprehensive knowledge rendered the phrase "Google it" unnecessary when it came to our town. In fact, if you Google questions about Oceanport, the response comes back as "What are you asking us for? Ask Frank Baricelli." Google now has some work to do.

I like to think that when somebody dies, a little piece of them remains behind in all the people they have come in con-

tact with during their lives. Well, in this case, a great big piece of Frank Baricelli remains for us and generations to come in "Oceanport A Great Place To Live." The Oceanport Historical Committee is selling softcover versions of this book for \$30.00 and hardcover versions for \$75.00. About fifty years from now, Oceanport's next written historical retrospective will certainly begin with the commercial and residential redevelopment of Fort Monmouth. In 2021, the Fort Athletic Club opened its doors and by the third quarter of 2022 had become the premiere multisport fitness facility in the Two Rivers area and certainly the only one with its name emblazoned on a historic water tower. The Park Loft, located in what was originally a Dance Hall built by the Army in 1941, opened its doors in 2022 to great acclaim. If you visit this site, I promise

Overnight Parking Ban



Dog and Cat License Information

The Borough of Oceanport requires all dogs and cats to be licensed every year and to have a current rabies vaccine. The State of NJ mandates current as valid through October 31st of the licensing year.

Application for new or renewal of license for 2023 is due January 31st, 2023 ONLINE at:

Fee: \$18 per pet if not spayed/neutered or \$15 per pet if spayed/neutered. Licenses expire January 31st, 2023 and a late fee applies after February 28th.

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that you will be stunned by how meticulously and beautifully this old building has been reimagined. The developer has reused all the old wood to create a space that is, at once, historically significant and stunningly modern, a place where the Tommy Dorsey Band AND Brian Kirk and the Jirks could play on the same night at the same event. Birdsmouth Brewery opened in 2022 at the site of the old Commissary and an ice cream factory --- yes, you read that right, an ice cream factory --- began construction next door to the brewery in October. And, in October of 2022, it was announced that a new sports bar and restaurant --- Baseline Social - will be opening in the last remaining spot in the Commissary building in 2023. But Baseline Social will be much more than a sports themed place to eat: its plans include a large LED viewing wall, a 38-seat platform lounge, five virtual golf bays and an outdoor fire pit lounge.

But the big news in commercial development at Fort Monmouth is that FMERA approved a contract of sale with Netflix for the conveyance of close to 290 acres of property for about 47 million dollars. This is the biggest and best news for the Borough of Oceanport since Buddy Brocklebank was born. When the transaction closes, Netflix will own just about everything on the main post in Eatontown from the Main Gate on Route 35 to the bowling alley. In Oceanport, Netflix will end up with about 140 acres, including the McAfee Center and its campus, the FMERA office (the old library), the marching grounds, Cowan Park and the 400 Area (the land across the street from the main post on Oceanport Avenue). The net effect of the sale of these lands to Netflix is that there are no remaining parcels to be sold in the Oceanport section of the Fort.

A little over a decade ago, Oceanport's most important economic and social driver, Fort Monmouth, closed. When the Fort shut down, thousands of jobs disappeared, families moved away and an empty barren Fort Monmouth served as a constant reminder of what we had lost. From a redevelopment standpoint, what FMERA has done with the Oceanport section of Fort Monmouth is nothing short of remarkable. Netflix's arrival allows for an incredibly advantageous and creative re-use of this property and will serve to restore a great deal of vitality ad social energy to Oceanport, Eatontown and Monmouth County at large. We are thrilled to be part of the proposed redevelopment and we look forward to participating with Netflix and FMERA in the continued economic and social revitalization of Fort Monmouth.

2022 also saw Oceanport's Gatta Park receive a long needed upgrade and three multi-sport turf fields opened on November 5th to great fanfare. Oceanport's recreation soccer program christened the new surface with a full slate of games that started at 9:30 am and ended just before sundown. By the time spring arrives, it is expected that the turf fields will be in use on an almost non-stop basis by the Borough's recreation teams, travel teams, school teams, and various third party sports organizations. The Gatta Park fields cost about 3.2 million dollars to build and the annual

Borough of Oceanport • Office of Emergency Management The Mandatory Purchase of Flood Insurance Requirement

This community participates in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) which makes federallybacked flood insurance available for all eligible buildings, whether they are in a floodplain or not. Flood insurance covers direct losses caused by surface flooding, including a river flowing over its banks, a lake or ocean storm, and local drainage problems.

The NFIP insures buildings, including mobile homes, with two types of coverage: building and contents.

Building coverage is for the walls, floors, insulation, furnace, and other items permanently attached to the structure. Contents coverage may be purchased separately, if the contents are in an insurable building.

Mandatory Purchase Requirement: The Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973 and the National Flood Insurance Reform Act of 1994 made the purchase of flood insurance mandatory for Federally backed mortgages on buildings located in Special Flood Hazard Areas (SFHAs). It also affects all forms of Federal or Federally related financial assistance for buildings located in SFHAs. The SFHA is the base (100-year) floodplain mapped on a Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM). It is shown as one or more zones that begin with the letter "A" or "V."

The requirement applies to secured mortgage loans from financial institutions, such as commercial lenders, savings and loan associations, savings banks, and credit unions that are regulated, supervised or insured by Federal agencies such as the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation and the Office of Thrift Supervision. It also applies to all mortgage loans purchased by Fannie Mae or Freddie Mac in the secondary mortgage market.

Federal financial assistance programs affected by the laws include loans and grants from agencies such as the Department of Veterans Affairs, Farmers Home Administration, Federal Housing Administration, Small Business Administration, and the Department of Homeland Security's FEMA.

How it Works: Lenders are required to complete a Standard Flood Hazard Determination (SFHD) form whenever they make, increase, extend, or renew a mortgage, home equity, home improvement, commercial, or farm credit loan to determine if the building or manufactured (mobile) home is in an SFHA. It is the federal agency's or the lender's responsibility to check the current Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) to determine if the building is in an SFHA. Copies of the FIRM are available for review in most local government building or planning departments. Lenders may also have copies or they may use a flood zone determination company to provide the SFHD form. If the building is in an SFHA, the Federal agency or lender is required by law to require the recipient to purchase a flood insurance policy on the building. Federal regulations require building coverage equal to the amount of the loan (excluding appraised value of the land) or the maximum amount of insurance available from the NFIP, whichever is less. The maximum amount available for a single-family residence is \$250,000. Government-sponsored enterprises, such as Freddie Mac and Fannie Mae, have stricter requirements. The mandatory purchase requirement does not affect loans or financial assistance for items that are not covered by a flood insurance policy, such as vehicles, business expenses, landscaping, and vacant lots. It does not affect loans for buildings that are not in an SFHA, even though a portion of the lot may be. While not mandated by law, a lender may require a flood insurance policy, as a condition of a loan, for a property in any zone on a FIRM. If a person feels that an SFHD form incorrectly places the property in the SFHA, he or she may request a Letter of Determination Review from FEMA. This must be submitted within 45 days of the determination. More information can be found at https://www.fema.gov/how-request-flood-hazard-determination-review-fema

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debt service on the bond that was used to finance the improvements will be about \$220,000.00.

If we were only to rent out the fields for 40 weekends a year, 8 hours a day, we would generate about \$240,000.000 in revenue, thereby covering the debt service. The fields at Gatta Park will be utilized and rented seven days a week, however, and we are projecting that the revenue generated will far exceed our annual debt service. In addition to the Gatta Park turf fields, renovations to Community Center Park were completed and five pickleball courts were installed at Blackberry Bay Park where the roller hockey rink used to be. For those of you who have not gotten out to see the newly improved parks, we have drone videos of the park improvements on the Borough website's home page.

I am limited in the amount of space I can dedicate to analyzing and explaining this development in this newsletter. If you'd like to see a complete summary of both the property development in the Oceanport section of Fort Monmouth and the improvements to Gatta Park, Community Center and Blackberry Bay Park, please visit the Borough's website and look under "News and Announcements" on the home page.

The Borough held its annual Christmas Tree lighting on December 4th, and the Port Au Peck fire house was packed to the rafters with kids, adults and one very, very busy Santa Claus. This annual gathering is emblematic of everything that is good about being in a small town like Oceanport and it was great to see the event so crowded and the kids so enthusiastic. Earlier that day, the Port Au Peck Firehouse hosted the 4th annual KIDSGIVE gift wrapping and gift giving event. Over 150 gifts were wrapped and over 200 personalized Christmas cards and ornaments were made by children in our community as part of "Operation Sleighbells." At the end of the event, the volunteers (all children) formed a human chain and loaded every single gift, card and ornament into a truck for delivery to Family and Children Services of Monmouth County and Beacon of Life. While the kids were loading the presents, handing them from one to another as the gifts made their way from the fire house to the delivery truck, I was reminded of the Whos in The Grinch Who Stole Christmas. It was a very powerful and uplifting moment and I would highly recommend everyone to get involved with the event next year.
