Mayor's Message

I joined about 50 Oceanport residents for a bus tour of Fort Monmouth on Saturday, March 16th and I believe that if there are more bus tours of this type more Oceanport residents should take advantage of this unique opportunity to get a first-hand look at what has --- and what hasn't --- taken place in furtherance of the Fort's redevelopment since the Fort's closure. By all accounts, those who participated were pleased with what they saw and heard.

The Fort Monmouth property is comprised of approximately 1100 acres, all of which are within the borders of Oceanport, Tinton Falls, and Eatontown. About 430 acres are located within the Borough of Oceanport. When the Fort Monmouth Economic Revitalization Authority was created by our state legislators in 2010 (over Oceanport's objections), FMERA was designated as the entity charged with the duty of redeveloping the entire parcel. Boiled down to its essential elements, the net effect of this legislation was that FMERA became the property owner (subject to numerous restrictions) of what was formerly as Fort Monmouth. FMERA's development of the property is subject to what is known as the "Fort Monmouth Reuse and Redevelopment Plan" which was drawn up and approved in 2008 by another state- created agency called the Fort Monmouth Economic Revitalization Planning Authority (FMERPA). If you've been here a while, you may remember the series of public charettes conducted by FMER-PA in Oceanport, Tinton Falls, and Eatontown as this Reuse Plan was being constructed. The final document is mindnumbingly long and data intensive. What is most important to remember about this Reuse Plan, however, is its mandate that 720 residential units have to be built in the Oceanport section and that the State of New Jersey's affordable housing regulations - requiring that 20% of the units must be affordable housing units - apply to the entirety of the property.

The Oceanport section, also known as the Main Post, includes the "400 District" (which is the right hand side of Oceanport Avenue as you head towards Little Silver), the Marina Parcel (where the restaurant is), Barker's Circle (the dormitory like buildings across the street from Riverside Avenue which includes the site of our current police station), the Allison Hall Parcel (where the big "golf balls" used to be along Oceanport Avenue), the Lodging Parcel (to the west of Allison Hall and scheduled to be sold by FMERA to Somerset Development for the development of 185 residential living units), East Gate (68 old officers' quarters units which are being offered for sale right now), Liberty Walk (48 rental units

Oceanport Police Traffic Advisory NJ Marathon Runs Through Oceanport on Sunday, April 28th

The Oceanport Police Department advises that the 2019 New Jersey Marathon and Half Marathon will start and run though Oceanport on Sunday, April 28th. The marathon (full and half marathons) will begin at the Monmouth Park Race Track entrance off Oceanport Ave at 7:30 am.

The course runs from the Main Gate at Monmouth Park off Oceanport Ave onto Crescent Pl. Runners then proceed north on Eatontown Blvd. to Wolf Hill Ave., east on Pemberton Ave. to Oceanport Ave. then south to Port Au Peck Ave. Then proceed east to Myrtle Ave. and make a left turn north on Myrtle Ave to Monmouth Blvd to Port Au Peck. Runners then turn left north onto Port Au Peck Ave., proceed north to Pocano Ave., then south on Comanche Dr. Runners will then turn left onto Monmouth Blvd. and head over the Pleasure Bay Bridge into Long Branch.

Oceanport Ave. between the Main Gate of the Track and Port au Peck Ave will close at 5:30 am. Roadways in Oceanport, along and near the marathon route, will close at 7:00 am and will reopen to traffic as the last runners run from west to east, and eventually cross the Pleasure Bay Bridge. All roadways within Oceanport will open to vehicle traffic by approximately 9:30 am. Roadways in the western and central sections of Oceanport will reopen much earlier. Oceanport Ave. from the Main Gate of the Racetrack to Port Au Peck Ave. will remain closed until 5:00 pm.

All residents are asked to plan ahead, as vehicles will not be able to move through the many sections of Oceanport during this time. Residents who reside from Myrtle Ave. and points west can travel out of town via Bridgewater's Dr. to Oceanport Ave./Main St. Residents who reside east of Branchport Ave. and south of Monmouth Blvd., can travel out of Oceanport via the Branchport Creek Bridge into Long Branch.

Residents that live north of Monmouth Blvd., and who reside in the Port Au Peck section between Monmouth Blvd. and Comanche Dr., can pre-position their vehicles and park them legally (do not block driveways or fire hydrants) on Hiawatha and Algonquin Aves west of Port Au Peck Ave. They can then exit Oceanport via Bayview Ave. to Monmouth Blvd. to Myrtle Ave. and travel west or north by crossing into Little Silver.

Parking will be prohibited on Wolf Hill Ave., Pemberton Ave., Monmouth Blvd., Port au Peck Ave. between Monmouth Blvd. and Pocano Ave., outside of Blackberry Bay Park on Port Au Peck Ave., Pocano Ave., and Comanche Dr. between Pocano Ave. and Monmouth Blvd. The Police Department asks that all parked vehicles be removed from the above listed roadways the night prior to the event. Any vehicles that remain the morning of the race will be towed. *Emergency No Parking* signs will be posted the night prior to the race.

If an emergency requires you to drive through the marathon area during this time, contact the Police Department at (732) 222-6300 for instructions and assistance. comprised of what was previously non-commissioned officers housing), the Squier Hall parcel (proposed site of a satellite campus of New Jersey City University), the MacCafee Complex (45 acres and a 100,000 sf building which is set to go out for bid shortly as a Green Tech Campus or Research Park), the Nurses' Quarters (3.75 acres just off of Main Street that is slotted for 24 residential units), the Warehouse District (8 acres for non-residential use), the Post Office District (6 acres for non-residential use).

Several parcels have already been sold and, because they have been sold, they are considered to be part of Oceanport and can be found on our tax rolls. These properties include Russel Hall, Liberty Walk, East Gate, the Oceanport Municipal Complex, Everlasting Life Church, Family Promise and Acute Care. Right now, the Fort Monmouth property is a hodge-podge of County owned property, Army owned property, FMERA owned property and privately-owned property. When it is complete, because of the great number of commercial properties and the large number of residential units within the 430 acres, it will most likely have a different feel and different vibe than the rest of Oceanport. Given the fact that its full development will increase our town's land mass and housing stock by a third, it is important that Oceanport's citizens be aware of what is happening on the Fort property. To that end, more of us should be attending planning board, municipal council and FMERA meetings. Change is not always good, but its not always bad, either. The more we educate ourselves about these changes, the better prepared we will be to shape them and ensure that our community continues to thrive.

Finally, I would like to apologize to Ryan Chiavo, the second-place award winner in the Borough's annual calendar contest. Her name was printed incorrectly on the back of our Borough calendar and for that we are sorry. Next year, we will put Buddy Brocklebank in charge of the contest to ensure that a similar mistake is not made.
