# Mayor's Message

The kids are out of school, summer is barreling along, and our little borough of Oceanport is in full bloom. Monmouth Park Racetrack has had a prosperous meet so far (with a 7% increase in attendance and a 2% increase in its handle as of the end of last month) and the State of New Jersey had a greater sports betting handle than Nevada in the month of June! Of course, New Jersey biggest racing day – which includes The Haskell and the Oceanport Stakes -- takes place at Monmouth Park and will serve to make the 2019 meet an even bigger success.

But horseracing and sports betting aren't the only reasons to visit Monmouth Park. On August 4th, the 14th Annual Kortney's Challenge 2 Mile Fun Run/Walk will start behind the gates at the main entrance of the track and this very Oceanport event promises to be the biggest and best one to date. Registration and check-in start at 8:30 a.m. and the race starts at 10:00 a.m. sharp. The rest of the summer offerings at Monmouth Park include a Picnic Pig Roast, a Mardi Gras Festival, a BBQ & Craft Beer Festival, Trucktemberfest, Oktoberfest and Rockfest. The only thing missing is a Buddy Brocklebankfest!

The Borough is also making headway with both the new Borough Hall Complex at the Fort (bids are being taken this month) and the development of the old Borough Hall Complex. It is hoped that both will be under way before the end of 2019.

With Action Camp in full swing and with the kids out of school, I need to remind everyone to drive a little bit slower on the streets of Oceanport. This is a year 'round issue for us, but it is especially important that we slow down and take our time when we drive during the summer months. Roll your windows drown, take your foot off the gas and enjoy the sights and sounds of Oceanport at a slower speed.

It has been an especially hot summer and, as many of you are aware, the Oceanport Pool at Blackberry Bay Park is not open for business for the first time in since it was built. Not many people know that the pool facility was financed and built mostly by members of the Oceanport Lions Club in the 1970s so that Oceanport could have its own little chlorinated oasis within Blackberry Bay Park. Beginning in the late 70s, the facility was operated and managed by the Oceanport Lions Swim Club (an entity unrelated to the Oceanport Lions Club) pursuant to a lease agreement with the Borough of Oceanport (the pool is on borough property). Much in the same way that the Borough's youth rec sports programs are run by volunteers, the pool was run by volunteers.

### **Home Improvement Reminder**

Warmer weather is here and brings a busy time for Oceanport! Residents are eager to start cleaning up after the long, cold winter. Sometimes, a little too eager, and before making sure the improvements they want to complete do not require approval from the town.

This is a friendly reminder that before work gets started give the Construction Department a call to see if any town approvals are required. If you have a contractor, he or she should do his/her due diligence as far as town approvals before proceeding with the work.

Below is an example of work that would need prior approval from the town:

- Any changes to the grading of your property
- Building a patio and/or a deck
- Installing a driveway, curbing, walkway, retaining wall
- Installation of pavers, mailboxes, fences
- Landscape along the road (Borough Right of Way)

When in doubt, just give the Construction Department a call at (732) 222-0641. Please know that any work done without prior approval, may be subject to fines and penalties. Let's all do our

# Water Droplets: Tips from Oceanport WaterWatch

Oceanport is almost surrounded by water – being bordered by Parker's, Oceanport, and Branchport Creeks and the Shrewsbury River. Did you know that your individual actions on your property affect the health of these waterways?

Water – whether it be from rain, or the use of water for washing cars, power-washing, landscaping, gardening, or pool draining – washes or runs off lawns, driveways, parking lots, and streets and roadways into storm drains (the metal grates in streets to alleviate road flooding) that lead directly to these waterways. Much to many residents' surprise, this "stormwater runoff" does not get treated or filtered. Anything that is on these surfaces can be washed into our creeks, rivers, bays, and, ultimately, the ocean.

That's right: so whether it be when Fido's waste doesn't get picked-up and put in the garbage, or when someone throws a cigarette butt or garbage out their vehicle window or on the ground, or when homeowners and businesses spray pesticides, herbicides, and fertilizers on their properties, this can all find its way into our coastal waters, thereby posing harm to the wildlife in and around these waterways, and possibly impacting human health as well. Pollutants in this runoff such as bacteria, nitrogen, and phosphorus - can lead to the following impacts: closed beaches and shellfish beds, algal blooms which can lead to fish kills, contaminated sediments in waterways (which can be problematic and costly if dredging is needed), alterations in the life cycles of aquatic organisms, public health risks and fish consumption advisories for humans, and hazards to wildlife through ingestion of and entanglement with litter.

Though people and their everyday habits are often the source of this pollution, we can easily be the solution: don't litter, cleanup after pets whether walking around town or on your own property; follow state guidelines for using fertilizers (and remind your landscapers as well); reduce or eliminate use of fertilizers and pesticides; inform your neighbors and friends; and be mindful of what you are using on your property as it directly can impact the waters that surround our town, and beyond.

Following the 2016 summer season, however, the volunteers who had overseen the operations of the pool on behalf of the Oceanport Lions Swim Club advised the Borough that it was no longer fiscally feasible for them to continue to maintain and operate the facility and that they were no longer going to do so. In a nutshell, a continuing decline in membership and a concurrent rise in operating costs meant that the pool club was no longer financially viable. For the next two years, the pool was operated and managed by the YMCA, the only entity that responded to the Borough's RFP for the pool concession. This past winter, the YMCA advised the Borough that it would not be able to operate the pool for the 2019 summer season and, despite the Municipal Council's best efforts, the Borough did not get any credible responses to our RFP for the pool concession this year.

The Oceanport Pool has been a part of the fabric of Oceanport for several generations, but we can't keep the pool open at any cost. Like any other municipal program, the Municipal Council will have to weigh the costs and benefits in order to determine what the future holds for this amenity. In its absence, I hope we can all enjoy our backyard pools, beach clubs, and the Shrewsbury River to keep cool and have fun this summer. Enjoy every moment of it because Labor Day weekend is right around the corner!

# Summertime Library News

The Read-to-Me and Vacation Reading Clubs are well under way and will run through August 10th. There is still plenty of time to register and finish the program which is all online. Vacation Reading Club (VRC) members need to read 480 minutes (8 hours) to finish the program and Read-to-Me Club members need to have 20 books read to them. 
