Mayor's Message

Summer is rushing towards us, but not as fast as motor vehicles are rushing through Oceanport's streets. This isn't really a new thing and, quite frankly, even though summer traffic exacerbates the situation, it really isn't even a summer thing. No matter the time of year, whether you are on Comanche, Port-Au-Peck, Burnt Mill Circle, East Main Street, Main Street, Pemberton, Bridgewater, Asbury, Monmouth Boulevard, Asbury or pretty much anywhere else in town, you've undoubtedly noticed a lot of cars going well in excess of the posted speed limit. And it isn't only out of towners cutting through Oceanport who are speeding. The number of Oceanport residents speeding through town – even in their own neighborhoods — is both disappointing and frustrating to say the least.

Unlike Monmouth Beach and Sea Bright, however, Oceanport has more than one main vehicular artery and the advent of community-based GPS programs like "Waze" has allowed drivers to avoid speed traps and traffic. Chief Kelly will be allocating his resources so that we will increase both radar-based speed control signage throughout Oceanport and targeted radar/stop sign enforcement throughout the Borough. These targeted radar/stop sign details will be augmented by "Special 2" police officers the Borough recently hired. The Borough's Governing Body, Police Department, and Municipal Court system are going to do everything in their power to ensure that speeding in Oceanport is no longer an option.

Simply stated, if you are pulled over by the Oceanport police for driving in excess of the posted speed limit, you will not get a warning. Instead, you will get a ticket. Under the motor vehicle laws of the State of New Jersey, the fine for driving one mile over the speed limit is the same as it is driving nine miles over the speed limit. The faster you go, the higher the fines climb. The same is true for the points that will accrue to your driving record, except that driving one mile over the posted speed limit results in the same number of points (two) as if you are driving fourteen miles over the speed limit.

The one upside to getting a speeding ticket, though, is that it entitles you to an appearance before the Honorable John A. Patti in Oceanport's Municipal Court. In my personal opinion, the Walt Disney Corporation offers the only other ticket providing more entertainment value than spending a hot, humid Monday afternoon watching Judge Patti adjudicate his motor vehicle docket. As an added bonus, moreover, you are much more likely to have a Buddy Brocklebank sighting at our Municipal Complex than at Disneyworld.

While Monmouth Boulevard is subject to a good number of speeding vehicles on a daily basis, one day that was an

Important Information from the Oceanport Police Department TRAFFIC SAFETY

Motorists are reminded to watch their speeds and slow down. The OP Police Department has received numerous complaints regarding drivers speeding while driving in the Borough.

Throughout the summer months, OP Police officers will be conducting radar enforcement details on targeted streets throughout the Borough. We will be issuing summons, handing out informational pamphlets and brochures related to safe driving, but most importantly, showing a presence for drivers to reduce their speed and be cognizant of their speeds.

CRIME PREVENTION

There have been reports of many types of scams occurring where the scammers are attempting to gain personal information from people. Scammers have been calling advising that your social security number is "locked" or compromised. They attempt to obtain personal information from the victims. There are also the ongoing "Grandparents Scam" when someone calls to claim to be a relative and they have been arrested. They hand the phone to a "bail bondsmen" who request you wire or draw money out of the bank and that they will meet you to retrieve the "bail money". They sometimes use real relatives' names.

Some helpful tips to avoid being scammed:

- Know who you are talking to, do not be rushed into giving information.
- Do not open suspicious texts, pop-up windows or click on links of unknown emails or attachments.
- Keep your personal details secure, never give personal information to an unknown source, or suspicious source.
- Hang up on the suspicious call and verify with the suspected calling agency, department, source and/or entity that they are seeking information.
- Notify the Police of any suspicious scams, calls, transactions, or visits.

Car thieves continue to target and steal high end motor vehicles throughout the area and in Oceanport. They look for unlocked vehicles and take the cars to north Jersey. They have become more brazen and are even committing their crimes during daylight hours. We ask residents to lock their cars, remove keys and keys, park vehicles in well-lit areas, and report any suspicious vehicles, subjects, and activity to the Police.

"Knock, Knock, Whose There?" The Borough has in place a No-Knock ordinance for solicitors and companies who registered and have background checks completed by the Police Department. Solicitors who apply for a solicitor permit through the Borough, once checked, are given the No Knock List, and are given a permit which they must visibly have on along with a company ID.

Many times, companies come into town and solicit without a permit and the Borough and Police Department are unaware of this until a complaint is received or the police are called.

Residents should:

- When observing a subject soliciting on their property and the resident is on the No-Knock list please contact the police department of the incident, including a description of the person(s) soliciting.
- Contact the police of any suspicious incidents, vehicles, or subjects.
- Log onto the Oceanport Borough Website at www.Oceanportboro.com to add your address to the No-Knock List.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

There has been a dramatic rise in overdoses throughout the state and within Oceanport. To help spread the word that there is help for those battling addictions, the Oceanport Police has partnered with the Monmouth County Prosecutor's Office in Operation Helping Hands. One of the initiatives of the program is to distribute Helpline Palm Cards when officers encounter someone whom they believe would benefit from addiction treatment or recovery support services. The Palm Cards have our Helpline number on them (1-833-OHH-CARE). The Helpline is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Recovery coaches from RAFTS (Recovery Advocates for the Shore) are the ones who answer the calls and assist with providing a caller with treatment or recovery support services. If you, or someone you know is battling addiction please utilize this resource.

"Don't Be the Dealer"- Do not leave prescription drugs around the home. The Oceanport Police utilized a Drug Drop off Box located at Police headquarters. Drop off unwanted and unused pills and prescription drugs. No paperwork needed to be filled out and no questions asked. ******SYRINGES AND LIQUIDS WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED AT THE DROP OFF***

Mayor Coffey's Memorial Day Speech

Day Speech

Good morning everyone.

The fact is that the majority of people will not attend Memorial Day events this holiday weekend. So, thank you for taking time out of your day to venerate those who have sacrificed their lives so that we can enjoy the freedoms that we have here in America.

There are three days on our calendar upon which we recognize the people who protect us, keep us safe and keep us free. Armed Forces Day, which was observed on May 15th, is for those who wear the uniform. There are about 1.3 million active-duty members of the military and another 800,000 reserve forces.

Veteran's Day is for those who have worn the uniform. The last World War I veteran, Frank Buckles, died in 2010. 16 million people served in WW2 and only 450,000 are still alive. There are about the same number of surviving Korean War veterans and the average age of surviving Vietnam Veterans is 81. All told, there are about 22 million living military veterans in the US.

Memorial Day, however, is for the 3 million members in the US Military Service who never got to take the uniform off. For most of us Memorial Day is the ONE day of the year that we citizens pay homage to those who gave their lives for our freedom and our way of life. This is the most sacred of all the American holidays. For the family and friends of those who never got to take off their uniform, however, every day is sacred, every day is Memorial Day.

Our peaceful existence and our way of life can be taken away from us in an instant. Ask people who lived in Bosnia and Herzegovina. Lebanon was the Paris of the middle east in 1980. By 1982 it was a war zone. We've already forgotten what happened in NYC on September 1, 2001. It can happen in an instant. And these people who put their lives on the line for us each and every day are what stands between us and what we don't dare think about.

Most of us have not been affected by the horrors of war like many of our nation's veterans and Gold Star Families. We don't really understand the gravity of this day and what it means to lose a loved one to war. Take a moment today and think about how lucky we all are.

We have been gifted this amazing heritage of privileges and rights for which almost all of us didn't have to fight. It is our solemn responsibility to remember those who have died for those privileges and rights.

We can't personally thank those service members who have made the ultimate sacrifice, but people are gathering all across America today to honor them and to pray that the memory of their service will not be forgotten.

World War I was called the "War to End All Wars." It didn't quite work out like that. 320,000 service members died in that war. 320,000 people to honor. 320,00 names to remember. World War II, Korea, Vietnam, Iraq, Afgahnistan and so many armed conflicts in so many places followed the World to End All Wars that 1.5 million more service members died. 1.5 million. 1.5 million more people to honor. 1.5 million more names to remember.

We should all just take a moment to pray that at some future Memorial Day there will be no more new names to remember.
