Mayor's Message

And, just like that, summer is over. But what a summer it was for Oceanport. Early on, we were faced with an unprecedented fish kill and an equally unprecedented cleanup of 6,000 pounds of fish along our 11 miles of Shrewsbury River shoreline. Just a few days after that, over 100 volunteers gathered together and, by hand, removed so much debris from our shoreline that it ended up filling a 30 yard container. On May 31st, the Borough's biggest Memorial Day Parade in years took place, followed by a memorial ceremony at the Borough's new municipal complex. On June 5th, four Oceanport residents – Chris Macioch, Jeremy Julio, Bryan Zinski and John Majeski – paddleboarded thirty miles from The Marina in Oceanport to Battery Park in New York City to raise money for local charities. At about the same time, OPort Partners, LLC (a company owned by Denholtz Properties) began the first phase of its transformation and redevelopment of Parcel A on Fort Monmouth (this includes the former Commissary and PX, the Post Office are and Warehouse District) which will end up as a 26 acre mix of commercial uses, including a micro-brewery. On June 16th, the Borough of Oceanport entered the 21st century when we launched our own Facebook page and two weeks later renovations began at Maple Place School and Wolf Hill School in furtherance of the 33 million dollar referendum passed overwhelmingly by Oceanport's residents in 2019 so that Oceanport's schools could be transformed into 21st century learning environments.

In July, the Borough returned to "in person" Council meetings and Planning Board meetings at our new municipal building (although they can still be watched live on FIOS's Channel 28 and via the internet through the Borough's website). Then, on July 31st, the Borough of Oceanport honored the most important civil servant in our Borough's history by renaming Borough Hall the "Clement V. Sommers Municipal Building" as part of a day- long celebration of his incredibly full life. Over 225 residents and dignitaries attended the dedication ceremony, and we are sure Clem was smiling down on everybody in attendance.

On August 18th the Borough approved the sale of the first two of four liquor licenses available for new facilities located in the Fort Monmouth section of Oceanport (bringing in \$500,000 of much needed revenue). On August 25th, New Jersey City University officially opened its 76,000 square foot college campus in the renovated Squier Hall building in the Oceanport section of Fort Monmouth. NJCU will maintain a state-of-the-art nursing education center and will offer degrees in cybersecurity, fire science and business.

Bulk and Metal Pickup Scheduled Through Oceanportboro.com

Bulk and metal pickup can now also be scheduled through the Oceanport Borough website directly by clicking on "Citizen Request" in the middle of the home page or at www.oceanportboo.com/departments/dpw and clicking on "Bulk Pickup Request".

Just a reminder bulk items are furniture, carpeting, mattresses, etc. if bundled correctly. Please note bulk items are limited to three items (bundles, bags, etc.) no matter the size. Building materials are NOT considered bulk. Building materials are anything used to construct the home such as cabinets, vanities, sheetrock, tile, wood, windows, doors, etc. Construction debris, wood, windows or doors will NOT be collected and can not be placed at the curb with your bulk. Contractors are responsible for the removal and disposal of their debris. Items shall not be placed at the curb until dusk the night preceding your scheduled collection date but MUST be at the curb by 7:00 AM on the day of the scheduled pick-up.

Metal Pickups Are Mondays

Appliances, tires, and metal will also be picked up by the Oceanport Public Works Department. To schedule a metal pick-up follow the same procedure noted above through oceanportboro.com, call (732) 222-8221 or email publicworks@oceanportboro.com. Please item(s) at the curb by Sunday evening.

Important information from the Oceanport Police Department

TRAFFIC SAFETY

"Be Alert, Save a Life" Motorists are reminded schools are reopening and to be extra careful when driving in or near school zones! Watch for crossing guards, stop for pedestrians in the crosswalks, be aware speed limits are 25mph in or around school zones, allow for extra travel, and do not drive distracted.

Oceanport Police officers continue to conduct speed enforcement details on targeted streets throughout the Borough. We have, and continue to issue summonses, hand out informational pamphlets regarding the dangers of speeding, but most importantly, show a presence in problem areas so that drivers are aware of their speeds and are cognizant of their driving habits and the hazards around them.

CRIME PREVENTION

"Knock, Knock, Whose There?" The Borough has in place a No-Knock ordinance for solicitors and Companies who registered and have background checks completed by the Police Department. Solicitors who apply for a solicitor permit through the Borough, once checked, are given the No Knock List, and are given a Permit which they must visibly have on their person along with a company ID.

Many times, companies come into town and solicit without a permit and the Borough and Police Department are unaware of this until a complaint is received or the police are called. Residents should:

- When observing a subject soliciting on their property and the resident is on the No-Knock list please contact the police department of the incident, including a description of the person(s) soliciting.
- Contact the police of any suspicious incidents, vehicles, or subjects.
- Log onto the Oceanport Borough Website at www.Oceanportboro.com to add your address to the No-Knock List.

"Lock it or Lose it"-The Oceanport police remind residents to lock your vehicles, remove key fobs and valuable items from within your parked vehicles. We continue to respond to vehicle burglaries and vehicle thefts remain a problem in our area. It only takes a second to lock your car. Do not give the criminals the opportunity to steal your car and place other people at risk.

If you see someone or something suspicious in your neighborhood, please call the police at (732) 222-6300, or if the matter is serious in nature call 911. (An active car burglary, theft in progress...etc.)

"Don't Be Scammed" There have been reports of many types of scams occurring where the scammers are attempting to gain personal information from people. Scammers have been calling posing as the IRS, bail bondsman, utility companies, the FBI, you owe money for a bill, or that a relative has been arrested and needs bail money, that social security number is "locked" or compromised. They attempt to obtain personal information from the victims. There are the ongoing "Grandparents Scam"

when someone calls to claim to be a relative and they have been arrested. They hand the phone to a "bail bondsmen" who request you wire or draw money out of the bank and that they will meet you to retrieve the "bail money". They sometimes use real relatives' names.

Some helpful tips to avoid being scammed:

- Know who you are talking to, do not be rushed into giving information.
- Do not open suspicious texts, pop-up windows or click on links of unknown emails or attachments.
- Keep your personal details secure, never give personal information to an unknown source, or suspicious source.
- Hang up on the suspicious call and verify with the suspected calling agency, department, source and/or entity that they are seeking information.
- Notify the Police of any suspicious scams, calls, transactions, or visits.

"Don't Be the Dealer"- Do not leave prescription drugs around the home. The Oceanport Police utilized a Drug Drop off Box located at Police headquarters. Drop off unwanted and unused pills and prescription drugs. No paperwork needed to be filled out and no questions asked. ******SYRINGES AND LIQUIDS WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED AT THE DROP OFF***

The Police Department is receiving a large number of requests from residents for Firearms Permits and Purchase Cards. The process is automated and for firearms permit process information and forms log onto www.njsp.org/firearms.

Leaf Collection Guidelines & Schedule



To serve residents better, each zone will have four different weeks assigned for collection through the season. Please refer to the street listing to see what zone your street is in and mark your calendars with your leaf pickup weeks.

When can I put out my leaves? There are 3 collection zones. Collection week begins on a Friday to Thursday. Leaves can go out the no earlier than the Wednesday BEFORE your pickup week and must be out no later than Monday of your week. Be sure to get your leaves out as early in the schedule as possible as the last weeks are dependent upon weather conditions. If someone services your property other than yourself, please be sure they have registered with the Borough as a copy of the schedule below is mailed to all registered landscapers every September.

Leave Collection Guidelines

- 1. **LEAVES ONLY** to be places at the curb which should be free of branches, stones, hay, and other debris. These items make it difficult for vacuum to pick up the leaves. More importantly, the flying debris can cause injury to the Public Works employees and can also damage equipment. Any piles that contain such debris will be left behind, not cleaned up, and you will receive a notice.
- 2. Please keep piles straight, neat, and in the street as close to the curb as possible. Try not to make the piles any larger than four feet wide and four feet high if possible. Please be careful not to block off too

much of the road with your piles. Cars must go around these piles sometimes going into the oncoming lane which can cause accidents. Cars also tend to drive through these piles scattering leaves all over the road which can create hazardous road conditions when it rains.

3. Do not place leaf piles on top of storm drains. This will impede proper storm water runoff and create flooding in the roadways. The leaves get inside the catch basin and will eventually clog pipes. Also, if you live on a corner lot, please try to place leave piles on the street that has less traffic.

4. Please remember the Public Works Department does not pick up branches or sticks. The garbage contractor will pick up 3 tied and bundled branches and tree limbs each trash pickup day for that site. For bundles to be picked up they must be tied and bundled and not to exceed 5 feet long by 3 feet in diameter piles. The garbage collector will also take branches placed in garbage can as long as they do not stick out of the can and the can is able to be dumped easily and not jammed in. Contractor is not required to pick up any tree stumps nor individual tree limbs or branches that exceed 3 inches in diameter.

History was made in late August when the "Oceanport 1" softball team (pictured below), led by Joe "I'll Play For Any Team That Will Have Me" Iannuzzelli, captured its FOURTH consecutive Two Rivers Over 40 Softball A League championship, and "Oceanport 2", led by Craig "I Can't Believe Iannuzzelli Plays in the A League" Sears prevailed in the championship game in the B Division. Admittedly, winning the B Division is like being selected as the smartest kid in your home school class, but a championship is a championship. And both teams raved about the condition of the softball field at Blackberry Bay Park during the playoffs, which may be even more impressive than the championships won. Kudos to our DPW for that.

The fact is, however, that if you look closely at most of our parks, you'll notice that there has been a vast improvement in how they look and that is all due to the herculean efforts of the Borough's Department of Public Works. In June, the Municipal Council opted to terminate a third-party agreement for lawn maintenance in favor of, once again, having our DPW staff perform these tasks. Take a walk through Old Wharf, Evergreen, BlackBerry Bay and Charles Parks and you will see the obvious and tangible results of DPW's efforts over the past couple of months. And improvements to Community Center Park, Trinity Park and Gatta Park are in the works! Our parks haven't looked this good since Buddy Brocklebank was a young man. But, in our eyes, Buddy is still a young man.

Finally, our Police Department has had a very busy summer implementing its summertime radar enforcement campaign. The OPD conducted 238 radar details, stopped 460 vehicles and issued 205 summonses during July and August. Fixed radar recognition/display units have been placed on Port Au Peck Avenue near Shrewsbury and at East Main Street near the First Aid Building, a radar speed signboard will be placed in various places throughout town in the very near future and a radar speed data collector will soon be tracking vehicle speeds and volume on targeted roadways. The Oceanport Municipal Court is going to be very busy, very soon!

We will be closing out our summer on September 11, 2021 with a 9/11 Memorial Service at the Clement V. Sommers Municipal Building at which time we will be installing a piece of the World Trade Center as a permanent part of our municipal memorial area. This item was donated to the Borough in 2012, but Hurricane Sandy prevented it from being dedicated at our old municipal building. Details about the ceremony will be posted on the Borough's Facebook Page and website. Later that evening, at 8:46 pm, Oceanport's annual Summer's End event will go dark for three minutes as we participate in the "Light Up The Shore" event honoring the lives lost in the terrorist attacks of 9/11/01 and remembering the heroism displayed by citizens and first responders in response to these horrific events. Summer's End is a communal, small-town function that brings all of Oceanport together and, given what we've had to endure these past 18 months or so, I can't help but believe that something that reminds us all of what we have in common will be a welcome respite from all that has recently divided and isolated us.
